KEEP ON THE SUNNY SIDE

How many of you remember the television show “Mission Impossible?” It began in 1966; and was introduced with experts from various fields being recruited to solve a problem by the Impossible Mission Force (IMF). These experts received a message outlining the latest task to tackle. Then, the prerecorded message would end with the statement: “This is your assignment should you choose to accept it.” You could decline.

Okay: Let’s try another question. Does anyone remember the television Western Series (Hint: the series was from 1957-1962— “wagon was part of the title.) Remember: “Wagon Train? Like “Mission Impossible,” “Wagon Train,” focused on people with a mission to leave Missouri and travel to California for a new home. The story began as the wagons pulled out when the leader called: “Wagons Ho!” and off they went!

5, 6, 7, and 8: Who Do We Appreciate? The Lord Jesus Christ.

“Nevertheless, do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice that your names are written in Heaven.” (Luke 10:20 ESV)

REMINISCING!

As a young girl, I always looked forward to both adventures each week. The stories, the individuals, and the anticipation about what was going to happen next kept me glued to our small, black-and-white television set. I always set the scene in our living room by turning out the light and sitting cross-legged in front of the television, volume up, and eyes glued to the screen.

APPRECIATION!

When I read newspaper articles about police, fire academy, local, state, and federal employees, judges, hospital employees, businesses, teachers, social workers, postal clerks, all other employees whose jobs and careers benefit all of us, I celebrate all they have done for us.

Our Gospel, Luke 10:20 (ESV), at the top of this article, is suspenseful. Jesus is sending out 70 disciples in pairs of two with specific instructions. We are told the disciples are traveling without Jesus; they are going ahead of him. Jesus warns them that they are like lambs among wolves. They travel in pairs for protection. They did not take a purse, bag, extra clothes, and no extra sandals. They were not to stop and talk. They were to keep to schedule. When they arrived at their destination, they stayed with the individual who invited them, they ate what was provided, and slept at the home where they were first welcomed. They did not change households later for one that provided more or better amenities. This was the concept of “hospitality”: staying with the one who invited you first. If not welcomed by anyone in the town, Jesus instructed them to dust off their feet and go elsewhere...and whoever listened...and received the disciples, also received Jesus (Matthew 10:14, ESV). If they rejected Jesus’ disciples, they also rejected Jesus (Luke 10:16, ESV).

The disciples followed Jesus’ instructions and, later, when they returned to him, they were full of joy celebrating that even “the demons submitted to them” (Luke 10:19, ESV). Jesus had given them power over snakes, scorpions, and other enemies; nothing would hurt them (Ibid.)

This Gospel reminds me of present-day trainees who have completed their orientation and training programs and are sent out by their supervisors for their first day on the job. This is their time to apply what they had learned. I celebrate for all those who were successful and those still striving. It is hard to apply what you have learned. I think we have all experienced this at one time or another on a new job. And, after the trainees return, they are given additional training as needed.

Generally, in most “workplaces” trainees and recruits are recognized for what they have successfully completed and continue to receive further instruction to acquire/develop more skill. Isn’t that the purpose of training?

Angela Duckworth, (the author of GRIT*), encourages us to “cultivate our interests by developing a habit of daily challenging ourselves and by connecting our work to a purpose beyond ourselves.” She points out that we can learn to hope when all is lost. As the Psalmist wrote: “Let your steadfast love, O LORD, be upon us, even as we hope in you” (Psalm 33:22 ESV).

We ALL can work to benefit others. And, just as Jesus said to the 72 disciples when they returned to meet with him, we can also rejoice by the work we do; and “Rejoice that our names are written in Heaven” (Luke 10:20, ESV).



SELF CARE WITH PASTOR RACHEL

October is a great time to be outdoors. I love the cooler temperatures, the falling leaves, and enjoying hikes and walks in our community. Walking is healing and allows our body and spirit to connect to God's creation.

SABBATICAL REFLECTION

Robert Putnam wrote a book several years ago called *Bowling Alone*. The basic premise to the book is that “both civic engagement and organizational involvement experienced marked declines in the second half of the twentieth century.” Essentially, there are fewer people joining groups and organizations and being involved in community. The book looks at the possible why’s as to the reasoning and the so what’s as to the consequences of these trends. While there is a decrease in joining and being involved, this book does not contest the benefits of belonging to an organization. I suspect we can all identify positive aspects to being affiliated with a group of people.

We can start with the blessings and positives to being a part of a church. We can likely speak on what we gain from being a part of something that is bigger than ourselves. We can gain at a physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual way when we are a part of an establishment. This was part of my motivation to study community for my sabbatical. I believe the benefits of belonging are rich and long-lasting for all people who participate and are involved. This is true for being a part of church, but it can also be seen in other events happening in the world today. There are events and gatherings out there that we can see are special, unique, and even sacred.

I won’t be able to talk in depth about all the places I visited. I can mention some observations I witnessed. Music has the potential to make any group in one place draw closer together. The festival and concerts I attended certainly point to the value of music, and the way music can reach inside each of us and touch the core of our being. Having a common goal is always helpful to bringing people together and allowing individuals to be more connected to others. There is a week set aside in Memphis to highlight parts of Elvis Presley’s life. I attended and participated in the candlelight vigil for Elvis. Thousands of people gathered in this one segment of Memphis, to remember and to recollect the “King.” Even though he has been gone for 45 years, the powerful emotions people felt were obvious, from the memorials people created, to the massive line waiting to go up and visit the grave.

When people have similar priorities and rules, community can form and flourish. I visited several sites called communities and they were intentional about what was important and valuable to the people gathered, and the values of people could be seen in how they acted and interacted with other people.

At this point, my hope is to keep learning, seeing what makes communities meaningful and powerful to the people who attend. And perhaps there will come a time when the church itself can learn how to improve the bonds and blessings of connection and community.

The Origins of Trick-or-Treat

Ever say or do something and think... “Where did this even come from?” Trick-or-Treat has been part of the American Halloween tradition for more than a century, but how and why?

Many historians speculate it began as a Celtic festival called “Samhain”. During this festival the Celts believed the spirits of the dead came to earth on the night of October 31st. The Celts would light bonfires, offer sacrifices, and honor the dead. They would also disguise themselves with animal skins to drive away “phantom visitors”. This led to people dressing up as ghosts and demons to perform specific acts in exchange for food and drink. This became known as “mumming” and turned into what we know as “trick-or-treat”. Did you know the term “trick-or-treat” did not become popular until it was used in comic strips and cartoons like Peanuts and “Trick-or-Treat” featuring Donald Duck and his nephews Huey, Dewey, and Louie?

Update on In-Person Services

Based on the fact that Covid cases continue to decrease in our community, Consistory decided at its February 21, 2022 meeting that starting this Sunday, February 27, 2022, not only will we return to in-person services, but those who have been fully vaccinated and boosted have the option to unmask if they so desire. They may remain masked if they want. Those who are not fully vaccinated and boosted are asked to remain masked while in the church. All attendees are asked to continue to social distance at all times, and when in the pews should stay at least six feet from other attendees who are not a part of their immediate family. Consistory feels that First Church can do this at this time if all remain careful, follow this policy, and do what is right for everyone. COVID-19 UPDATES

As of Monday, August 15th...

- ◆ 3216 cases were reported in PA. 1 in 4 in PA have been infected and 1 in 276 have died.

In Cumberland County:

55 cases of Covid were reported on 8/15/2022. This is an underestimate since many people who test positive at home do not report the results of their test. 1 in 4 people in the County have been infected. 1 in 276 have died from Covid. 24% have tested positive (an underestimate--see above).

72% of all ages in the County have been vaccinated and 95% of those 65 and over have been vaccinated.

Pfizer is working on a vaccine that contains some protection against the previous Covid virus (Delta and Omicron) and the most recent Covid subvariant called 5-A. If their testing is successful, the new booster may be available this Fall.

Reminder to all to get your flu shot relatively soon since it is predicted that the Flu possibly will be more widespread and may present earlier than usual.

SPY Summer Program for Youth THANKS First United Church of Christ!

This summer, First United Church of Christ became the newest church in Carlisle to be a host church for the SPY Program. SPY stands for Summer Program for Youth AKA "SPY CAMP".

For 6 weeks in June and July, approximately 50 SPY Campers and 8 SPY staffers met in Fellowship Hall for activities, learning, and discussions about important topics like responsibility, kindness, politeness, and respect. Every day after lunch, the campers went outside to play games and draw with sidewalk chalk on the First UCC Plaza. Every Friday the group enjoyed a Field Trip.

Special guests visited to teach the group skills, like ukelele lessons and vocal music. One day, adult leaders helped the children create their own quilt-squares to be stitched into a quilt to help create awareness about homeless people. This quilt will be displayed along with many others on the lawn of the US Capitol in Wash-

ington, DC.

On July 28, the final day of SPY Camp, the children and staff from First UCC, St. John's Episcopal, and St. Paul's Lutheran produced on-stage musical performances at the Carlisle Theater. Many family members and volunteers attended, cheering, clapping, and enjoying the students' performance.

THANK YOU to our First UCC members and friends who volunteered to set-up, serve, and clean-up lunches for the SPY children and staff during the 6-week session. A good time was had by all! Everyone remarked how respectful and responsible the SPY campers were during their stay. It was rewarding to see Fellowship Hall used to help the community in such a meaningful way!

October Tip of the Month

***Save the Leaves!**

Environmental Scientists tell us that one important way that earth-stewards can all help pollinators (and thereby also help birds, wildlife and the health of the planet) is to let our lawns and gardens “BE” this fall. Allowing leaves and dried seed-heads in flower beds to stand and compost naturally provides food for birds and habitat for insects. Fireflies, butterflies and other beneficial insects lay eggs in leaf litter and if you get rid of those leaves these organisms will be destroyed. If you can't leave leaves on your lawn, perhaps you can designate a place to pile them at the perimeter of your yard and use them as mulch in spring. Happy Fall to ALL creatures Great and Small!

Book Chat Update:

Book Chat meets in the Upper Room of First UCC at 11:00 AM on the first and third Sundays of each month. The group enjoys devotions, fellowship and book discussions.

Over the summer, Book Chat members read *Island of the Sea Women* by Lisa See. Based on historical facts, this story tells of the friendships and hardships of the haenyeo-diving women of Jeju island. Although long-sheltered from the "outside" world, the effects of political conflicts in nearby Korea and Japan, later joined by America, affected these women and their families in life-altering ways.

The Book Chat "To Be Read" list grows all year long and in August Book Chat members suggested many books to be considered for this year's reading. Voting narrowed the list to fifteen books of diverse genres to be read and discussed this year. The Book Chat list for 2022-23 will be posted in the hallway near the church office.

Currently, the Book Chat group is reading *The Lincoln Highway* by Amor Towles. Set in the 1950's, it is the story of 18 year old Emmett, just returned to his family's Midwest farm, after serving time in juvenile prison for involuntary manslaughter. With his mother long-vanished and his father deceased, Emmett is welcomed enthusiastically by his 8-year old brother Billy. Together they are greeted with the news that their farmstead home has been foreclosed. Emmett discovers an unexpected gift and note from his father, as well as two stowaways from prison who lead him on an adventure he was not anticipating.
